fol. Ir: one word by a later hand ('Benivieni');

fol. Iv: recipe in Latin for medical pills ('pillule Magistri Antonij Cermisoni');

fol. 1r: blank;

fol. 1v: half-fol. illumination with an open-winged eagle facing downwards with a ring in her beak;

fol. 1r-37v: *Triumphi* ('Incominciano itriumphi di messere Francescho Petrarcha Po[eta] fiorent[ino]', order: *Mortis* II, *Fame* Ia, *Amoris* II, *Amoris* I, *Amoris* III, *Amoris* IV, *Pudicitie*, *Mortis* I, *Fame* I, *Fame* II, *Fame* III, *Temporis*, *Eternitatis*); each triumph is preceded by a full-page illumination: *Triumphus Amoris* I (11r), *Pudicitie* (19v), *Mortis* (23r), *Fame* I (26r), *Temporis* (33r), and *Eternitatis* (35v); at the end of four *capitoli* of the *Triumphi* there is a rectangular-box illumination: below *Triumphus Amoris* II is a marble vase sprouting flowers and two cupids on the sides pulling some branches (10v), below *Triumphus Amoris* IV is a flower with golden leaves (19r), below *Triumphus Pudicitie* is a marble vase with flowers growing from it and a cupid in it holding branches (22v), and below *Triumphus Fame* III is the medallion portrait of a woman within a circular branch out of which come many leaves (32v);

fol. 37v: colophon: Qui finiscono itriumphy delmagnifico poeta fiorentino Messe[r] Francesco petrarcha. Deo gratias amen;

fol. 38r: blank;

fol. 38v: full-page half-bust portrait of Dante, followed by a note by a later hand ('Dantes');

fol. 39r: blank;

fol. 39v: full-page half-bust portrait of Boccaccio, below which is the note by a later hand ('Bocatius');

fol. 40r: blank;

fols. 40v-41r: Petrarch's note on Laura (<inc> Laurea [sic] propriis uirtutibus illustris & meis longum celebrata carminibus; <exp> in expectatos exitus acriter ac uiriliter cogitanti);

fol. 41r: a short note by the same hand ('In conuersione pauli ap[osto]li ad missam cantatur quaedam sequentia in qua i[n]ter caetera est hoc Pauli de Virgilio ad Maronis Mausoleum ductus fudit sup[er] eum pie rorem lacrimae quem te inq[ui]t reddidisse si te uiuum inuenissem poetarum maxime'; this note is a copy of the one written by Petrarch in his own copy of Virgil's works);

Occasional marginal annotations by a different hand provide some missing lines.

Decorated initials in gold for every *capitolo* of the *Triumphi* (fols. 2r, 5r, 7v, 11r, 13v, 16v, 19v, 23r, 26r, 28r, 31r, 33r, and 35v). In the upper half of fol. 2r is a coat of arms of the Montefeltro family encircled within a wreath and surrounded at each side by a flying cupid.
